GET READY TO CELEBRATE THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE D&R CANAL STATE PARK AND THE D&R CANAL COMMISSION IN 2024

Help us celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the D&R Canal State Park and the D&R Canal Commission in 2024

In 1974, most of the Delaware and Raritan Canal was declared a New Jersey state park, which is now used for canoeing, kayaking, cycling, fishing, horseback riding, birding, walking, jogging, and enjoying nature..

The D&R Canal Watch has been working with state park staff and the commission to plan a number of celebratory events for 2024.

A speaker series is planned, with two of the four presenters already scheduled. The featured speaker at our annual meeting on Sunday, June 16 at 2:00 p.m. will be canal historian Capt. Bill McKelvey. In 1976 Captain Bill wrote *The Delaware & Raritan Canal: A Pictorial History*, a photographic treasure trove of historic views of our canal. Two years later he followed that successful book with *Champlain to Chesapeake: A Canal Era Pictorial Cruise*, which included many photos of the D&R as well as the other inland waterways along the East Coast.

For the October 19 finale of the anniversary year, we are honored to host James C. Amon. Jim was the first executive director of the D&R Canal Commission. He will paint a picture of

where we were in the 1970s and where we were in the early 2000s when he retired from the commission. At that time the D&R Canal State Park was the most frequently visited state park in NJ. The commission started with virtually no money (the first several annual appropriations were \$50,000—a sum that even then was small), no recognition (almost no one knew that there was a D&R Canal, much less a canal commission) and a fair amount of hostility toward the idea that a separate commission had all this power. (The hostility came from the surrounding municipalities, the surrounding counties, the Division of Parks and Forestry and the NJ Water Supply Authority.) Jim was able to work with all of them and create the wonderful park that we all know today.

In the park's 25th anniversary year, we published a book of poems about our historic waterway. This year, thanks to Penelope Schott and many talented poets, we will

publish a new book of canal poetry. This volume will contain 50 poems, some new and some from the original publication.


In addition, park staff will sponsor and conduct a Scavenger Hunt. Details will be sent out early in the new year.

The Bridges of the Delaware and Raritan Canal

The stationary bridges along the D&R Canal today are very unlike the original structures that spanned this transportation corridor when it was used for boat traffic. Unlike Pennsylvania's Delaware Division Canal, all the bridges crossing the D&R Canal were initially movable and gave the canal an advantage - no height restriction. Low profile mule-drawn canal boats, heavily built steam-powered vessels, elegant tall-masted ships, and personal yachts were all able to navigate the corridor.

The first bridges along the D&R were A-framed swing bridges. The support for this simple, well-

designed timber bridge was built in the form of the letter "A" giving the bridge its name. From the peak of the "A" support beams, cables were strung downward and anchored to the bridge's deck; a span that reached over 68 feet in length. Horse, wagon, carriage, and pedestrian traffic crossed the canal when the bridge was in the closed position.

A bridge tender, employed by the canal company, was responsible for a crossing location where he operated the swing bridge by hand with the aid of a bridge key or wrench using a system of gears and cranks similar to the lift locks. The tender monitored the tension in the supporting suspension cables to keep the bridge in good working order by regularly climbing the attached ladder to the apex of the "A" where he could inspect and tighten the cables as needed. Each tender was provided with a house that was located adjacent to the assigned bridge. The housing was part of the tender's salary.

Adjacent to each bridge crossing was a small wood-framed structure large enough to accommodate a few items such as a chair, table, lamp, and small stove. This bridge tender station allowed the tenders some comfort as they waited for the sound of a boat horn or the blow of the conch shell that signaled the approach of an oncoming vessel. When heard, preparation to open the bridge began. A barricade halted the road traffic before the bridge gears put the well-balanced deck in motion. Slowly the long deck swung low across the waterway to the open position parallel to the side of the canal and cleared the



path for the oncoming boat traffic to proceed. Once through, the deck swung back across the canal into the closed position and road traffic resumed.

The A-framed swing bridge served the D&R Canal well for over 80 years before being replaced in the early part of the 20th century with the stouter kingpost style swing bridge better suited to handle the weight of the automobile. As the new horseless carriages arrived and gained popularity in the 19-teens, the need to retire the A-frames grew more pressing. By the 1920s, all the A-frames were replaced by the more practical King-Post swing bridges. Although the D&R Canal closed as a transportation corridor in 1932, these second generation swing bridges remained a fixture along the canal until they were removed and replaced in the early 1950s by the stationary bridges you see today.

News from the D&R Canal Commission meeting, September 20, 2023

Executive Director's Report

Director Hutchison reported that a large document scanner was delivered to the office from Ricoh on September 28. The staff will undergo training for its use. The staff has submitted approvals to the DEP Office of Management and Budget for the hiring of two temporary employees at a rate of \$25.80/hour to scan Commission project documents and save them to the DEP shared drive, where they can be easily accessed for project application reviews and "Open Public Records Act" (OPRA) requests.

Director Hutchison reported that the project to repair the former Belvidere-Delaware Railroad trestle bridge, which conveys the Delaware and Raritan Canal State Park multiuse trail over the confluence of the canal and the Wickecheoke Creek at Prallsville Mills, Stockton, has been completed. He noted that the reaction from people who have commented to the Commission staff has been overwhelmingly positive.

Director Hutchison reported that he and Darlene Yuhas began a long-term project to label and categorize on a spreadsheet the collection of Commission historical photographs, which have been kept in five three-ring binders in the Executive Director's Office. They are also examining how best to reproduce clear images from the photo negatives that are also kept in those binders. When completed, the Commission would scan the images, so that they can be shared with colleagues at the State Park Service and the rest of the DEP, as well as the NJWSA. He stated that he looked forward to working with the Commission's stakeholders to help identify images that have not been annotated.

Among the general permits issued this month were permits to relocate the USGS gaging station from the New Hope-Lambertville Toll Bridge to a location near the Lambertville Municipal Utilities Authority wastewater treatment plant while a project to rehabilitate the 119-year-old bridge is undertaken starting in January 2024 by the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission. Director Hutchison also issued an emergency general permit to the NJ Department of Transportation (NJDOT) for repairs to the bridge that conveys Landing Lane over the Delaware and Raritan Canal in New Brunswick. On September 29, 2023, a vehicle struck the southeast wingwall parapet of the bridge, causing part of the parapet and wingwall to fracture and fall into the canal. Fortunately, there were no apparent injuries, and Rutgers University was playing football in Madison, Wisconsin, which hopefully eased the Saturday traffic impact of the accident.

Park Superintendent's Report

DEP Chief of Operations Robin Madden stated that Superintendent Rojewski was unavailable to attend the meeting and that she would provide her report. Commissioner Designee Madden reported that repairs at the pedestrian bridge on the multiuse trail at the Prallsville Mills were completed on October 6, 2023, and that the trail was open.

Ms. Madden reported that the multiuse trail was closed in the Titusville area of Hopewell Township due to a breach in the canal wall that resulted in a sinkhole. The breach and sinkhole were reported on October 5, and NJWSA had initiated repairs. She further reported that the DEP Office of Resource Development is working with the DEP to initiate emergency repairs for the sinkhole at the Prallsville Mills, located behind the grist mill adjacent to Wickecheoke Creek.

Ms. Madden also reported that NJDOT was overseeing the emergency repairs to the Landing Lane Bridge. over the Delaware and Raritan Canal. She noted that a sinkhole caused by a collapsed storm sewer pipe was reported in July by a homeowner who lives on Easton Avenue/Main Street in South Bound Brook, adjacent to Delaware and Raritan Canal State Park property. Following assessment of the site conducted by the NJWSA and the State Park Service, it was determined that the pipe in question was not State infrastructure. South Bound Brook Borough subsequently determined it was not municipal infrastructure, and it was likely that the pipe was a drainage feature installed by a property owner without the required permitting. Although not assuming ownership, the State Park Service, with the help of NJDOT, would commence repairs to the pipe as an emergency measure. She noted that an application to authorize the emergency project would be submitted to the Commission in due course.

New Jersey Water Supply Authority Report

Mr. Michael Sellar informed the Commission that the project to rehabilitate the stone culvert, which conveys Six Mile Run underneath Canal Road, the D&R Canal, and the towpath in Franklin Township, Somerset County,

was underway. The project will involve periodic road and towpath, which will be posted on the park website. Closures would not occur in the evening or on weekends.

Mr. Sellar reported site work continues for Phase 1 of the project to repair an approximate 1.0-mile section of the western embankment of the Delaware and Raritan Feeder Canal in Stockton Borough. The embankment separates the canal from the Delaware River and is generally located between the Prallsville Lock and the railroad bridge crossing over the canal at Brookville in Stockton. He stated that work north of Bridge Street would be complete within the week, and the contractor would then move to the section south of Bridge Street. Work was anticipated to be complete within several weeks.

Mr. Sellar stated that NJWSA continued to monitor the Delaware and Raritan Canal and the Millstone River for a blue-green harmful algal bloom (HAB) caused by cyanobacteria (i.e., blue-green algae), which was detected in the Millstone River last summer; however, no bloom had been detected thus far. Mr. Sellar stated that NJWSA staff was addressing the sinkhole associated with a culvert on Easton Avenue (Route 527) in Franklin Township near the border of that municipality with South Bound Brook. He stated that a contract was awarded for the project and a preconstruction meeting was to be scheduled.

Mr. Sellar reported that NJWSA crews mobilized on October 5 to address the leak on the Delaware and Raritan Canal in Titusville mentioned by Commissioner Designee Madden, and that after repairs had been completed the multiuse trail was reopened. Mr. Sellar reported that NJWSA would be conducting autumn mowing and leaf maintenance seven days a week.

In-person meetings have resumed; they are held at Prallsville Mills on Route 29, just north of Stockton Borough.



- Sponsored lectures on topics such as "The Role of the Delaware and Raritan Canal in the Growth of Trenton's Industrial Potteries," "The Operation of the Joint Companies and the Interrelationship of the canal with the state's first railroad," "The Roebling Story," "Photography Along the Delaware and Raritan Canal

State Park: Treasure in Central New Jersey," "Meet Ashbel Welch, the second chief engineer of the Delaware and Raritan Canal," and Jim Amon on how the canal and the park changed during his tenure with the commission.

These include a digital camera, seven picnic tables, several benches, a laptop computer and software, a desktop computer, an LED projector, an inflatable screen for outdoor viewing of videos, a subscription to the Meetup website, a scanner, printer ink, a water testing kit, an external computer drive, lumber for canoe dock at Griggstown, folding tables and twenty chairs for Bulls Island, development of a new park website and maintenance of the site at the rate of \$50 per month, and professional courses for the maintenance staff.
